

As time passed, however, things didn't quite work out that way. When my family moved far from any ice rink, my lessons stopped. After a while, I knew my dreams of being like Brian would likely never come true. But as soon as I got my first job when I was 16, I started skating again. I started making a daily BART trip to San Francisco and soon found Angelo D'Agostino to coach me. And so the journey began again. Surely, there would be no Olympics for me, but, instead, I found glory in watching an unstable Mohawk turn into a strong one, a half loop turn into a full one and a wobbly spiral turn into my strongest move. Soon enough, a program full of requirements turned into a choreographed routine.

Sometimes though, dreams that never come true can haunt you. There were times when I thought, "What could've been?" What kind of skater would I have been if I had never stopped skating? Then one day, Thom Mullins came up to me and asked me to be in his first show. I, along with several other skaters, would skate under the big lights to a crowd full of people. My friends and family came out to watch and as I skated around, I saw them from the corners of my eyes, cheering quietly. My mom even cried. When I finished, there was a feeling of triumph that my skating had given me this very special moment. As I skated off the ice, I put my face in my hands, just like Brian. Is this what he felt like? Perhaps. All I knew was that there was no fancy medal around my neck, no crowd of a million people waving flags around and there was no championship to be won and yet, I had become the skater I was always meant to be. And again, skating had brought me to life.
